Rationale: Assessment completed 11/21/16. Three-year syllabus review. An increase to 4 credit hours is proposed as a way to add a necessary pronunciation and vocabulary component. Also, enriching the curriculum and increasing the credit hours from 3 to 4 will allow F-1 students completing our ESL Certificate to remain compliant with F-1 regulations. (Offering the course as 3 credits forces these students to take a course outside the ESL certificate in order to maintain good standing.)

Proposed Start Semester: Fall 2017

Course Description: In this course, international students will develop the listening, note taking and speaking skills needed for success in American college classrooms. Instructional activities will include a variety of formal speech acts, such as introducing, announcing and negotiating. In addition to mastering English Phonemes and suprasegmentals, students will focus on correct pronunciation of high-level vocabulary from the Academic Word List in the context of formal speaking. In this course, international students will develop the listening, note taking and speaking skills needed for success in American college classrooms. Instructional activities will include a variety of formal speech acts, such as introducing, announcing and negotiating. - 4. Demonstrate mastery of American English phonemes and suprasegmentals in formal presentations and in formal interpersonal conversations.
- 5. Perform advanced speech acts, such as introducing, thanking, negotiating, encouraging, interrupting, or announcing.
- 6. Practice active listening in interviewing situations.
- 7. Ask appropriate questions during presentations by instructor or guest speakers.
- 8. Use vocabulary from the Academic Word List during presentations and discussions.
