## **Course Objectives**

- 1. Differentiate major theoretical approaches.
- 2. Define key concepts of culture and socialization.
- 3. Compare and contrast the qualitative research with the quantitative research and the methods of data collection used for each approach.
- 4. Identify and explain the functions of social organization, groups (ex. elements, characteristics) and group dynamics.
- 5. Macro level: explain the functions and dysfunctions of social control on the social structure.
- 6. Micro level: explain the dynamics of social interaction (ex. role strain and role conflict and the impact on self-identify.)
- 7. Analyze the roots of social inequality.
- 8. Synthesis approaches on social inequality.
- 9. Explain the impact of race, gender, class and other forms of inequality on the social structure (macro) and social interaction (micro).
- 10. Explain the influences of social institutions (ex. the family, schooling, health and medicine, etc.) on culture and the individual.
- 11. Identify the functions and dysfunctions of social institutions.
- 12. Discuss sociological perspectives on domestic and global topics (ex. urbanization).
- 13. Explain the foundation for social change (ex. social movements).
